She brings to this position over 40 years of experience as a clinician, researcher, educator, and policy maker in public mental health. Previously, she was Assistant Commissioner, Division of Special Populations and Minority Services and the Chief Nurse for five Regional Mental health Institutes in the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities.
